The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2018.

Principal Activity

Croí's mission is to prevent cardiovascular disease, save lives and promote recovery & well-being.

The Company is limited by guarantee, not having a share capital.

The financial performance of the foundation is set out in our financial statements. Fundraising in the not-for-profit sector remained challenging, nonetheless 2018 was a successful year, both in terms of fundraising performance and delivery to our mission. Our Heart & Stroke Centre continues to be a very active research and development hub delivering evidence based and best practice programmes. Over 10,000 people directly engaged with our multidisciplinary health team across a varied portfolio of education, training and support activities.

Over the past year we have engaged with thousands of people in communities throughout the West of Ireland, offering them opportunities and support to transform their lives by reducing their risk of cardiovascular events as well as supporting those living with the impact of heart disease, stroke, diabetes and obesity.

Highlights of Activities & Achievements 2018

The Croí multi-disciplinary health team continued to design, develop and deliver a diverse range of innovative community based cardiovascular disease prevention and rehabilitation programmes. In the past year, our primary focus was on the delivery of the Croí MyAction programme, the Croí CLANN programme and the development and delivery of the Active Heart Programme in the Croí Heart & Stroke Centre. This latter initiative was a specially commissioned demonstration model for a National Community Based Cardiac Rehabilitation programme. Other programmes delivered both in the Centre and throughout the community included the Croí MyBalance & iBalance programmes (dietary advice & weight management); Cardiovascular Risk Screening; CPR & AED Training, Cardiac fitness assessments, Yoga, Pilates & relaxation classes; specialist physiotherapy sessions and exercise prescription as well as stroke survivor & carer support initiatives.

Other key developments in 2018 included:

Supporting the appointment of Professor David Wood, immediate past president of the World Heart Federation as Adjunct Professor of Preventive Cardiology at NUIG and Professor Bill McEvoy as Professor of Preventive Cardiology at NUIG and Research & Medical Director of the National Institute for Prevention and Cardiovascular Health (NIPC).

Leading the Ireland - I-ASPIRE survey of cardiovascular disease and diabetes prevention practice as part of a European programme. The principal investigators are, Prof David Wood, Dr Jim Crowley and Prof Bill McEvoy.

Expansion of our professional Training & Education programmes and short courses delivered under the banner of Croí / NIPC which included training in Motivational Interviewing, ECG Interpretation and a Masterclass series on cholesterol.

Leading a national expert technical group to review current literature and produce a consensus statement relating to the use of telemetry within cardiac rehabilitation programmes.

Through the National Institute for Prevention and Cardiovascular Health (NIPC), which was established by Croí as an affiliate of the National University of Ireland Galway (NUIG), our leadership in the area of cardiovascular disease prevention was strengthened with an increased professional & academic membership and the continued development of the MSc in Preventive Cardiology. This unique post graduate training programme continues to be the only one available in Ireland. It includes a taught element which is largely delivered at the Croí Heart & Stroke Centre where students have the opportunity to gain knowledge of, and experience in, the theory and clinical application of evidence-based preventive cardiology practice. Each graduate produced original applied health research, contributing to new knowledge in the advancement of preventive healthcare.

Croi's national and international reach was evidenced through the following activities in the past year:

Co-ordination and implementation of a trans-European Heart Failure Awareness Campaign as part of European Heart Failure Awareness Month – May 2018.

Hosting the 4th Global Heart Failure Patient Organisation capacity building academy attended by 45 delegates from across the globe, strengthening Croí's role in mobilising the patient voice in Europe and worldwide – June 2018.

Participating as part of a European Patient Organisation alliance to raise awareness of heart valve disease – this included leading a delegation to the European Parliament in Brussels – Sept 2018.

Participating on the Steering Committee of the European Heart Failure Policy Network in the development and launch of the Handbook of Multidisciplinary and Integrated Heart Failure Care which was launched in the EU parliament in Brussels – Sept 2018.

Participating on the Steering Committee of the European Patient Innovation Summit in Dublin - Oct 2018.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

for the year ended 31 December 2018

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Croí - The West of Ireland Cardiac and Stroke Foundation Company Limited by Guarantee is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2018 have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in Ireland and Irish statute comprising the Companies Act 2014 and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention except for certain properties and financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the Companies Act 2014 and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

Consolidated accounts

The company is entitled to the exemption in accordance with section 297 of the Companies Act 2014 from the obligation to prepare group accounts.

Income

Voluntary income consists of annual donations, sponsorship, gifts and the proceeds of fundraising activities which are recognised as received, together with deposit interest earned in the year. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

As with many similar charitable organisations, independent groups from time to time organise fundraising activities. However, as amounts collected in this way are outside the control of the Company, they are not included in the financial statements until received or deemed receivable by the Company.

Deferred Income

Income received for a number of projects is carried forward and included as deferred income within creditors when it can be foreseen with reasonable assurance that expenditure on such projects will not take place due to timing and / or other operational considerations in the year in which the income was received. Income received for projects which have not taken place but for which expenditure has been incurred has been recognised in the income statement to the extent that costs are matched with revenue. In such circumstances no net profit is recognised until the projects are complete. The Foundation considers that this treatment results in proper matching of costs and revenue.

Resources Expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any value added tax which cannot be fully recovered.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity.

Gifts In Kind

The value of any material gifts in kind is recognised as other income when the value is ascertained.

Capital Reserves, Designated Funds and Unrestricted Funds

The Capital Reserves represents the unamortised value of income used for capital purposes.

Unrestricted Funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objectives of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Designated Funds are funds earmarked by the Board of Directors for particular purposes.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. Cost includes costs directly attributable to making the asset capable of operating as intended. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of property, plant and equipment, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Land and buildings freehold - 2% Straight line Fixtures, fittings and equipment - 20% Straight line

The carrying value of property, plant and equipment are reviewed annually for impairment in periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

Financial assets

Investments held as fixed assets are stated at cost less impairment for any permanent diminution in value. Income from other investments together with any related withholding tax is recognised in the income statement in the year in which it is receivable.

Trade and other receivables

Receivables with no stated interest rate and receivable within one year are recorded at transaction prices.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the statement of financial position bank overdrafts are shown within payables.

Trade and other payables

Payables with no stated interest rate and payable within one year are recorded at transaction prices.

Employee benefits

When employees have rendered service to the company, short term employee benefits to which the employees are entitled are recognised at the undiscounted amount expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

Taxation and deferred taxation

The Company is not liable to Corporation Tax by virtue of it having been granted charitable status by the Revenue Commissioners under Reference CHY 7500.

Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution and PRSA pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the company in an independently administered fund. Contributions are charged to the income statement in the year in which they fall due.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

The preparation of these financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses.

Judgements and estimates are continually evaluated and are based on historical experiences and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The company makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will be, by definition, seldom equal to the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

(a) Establishing useful economic lives for depreciation purposes of property, plant and equipment Property, plant and equipment comprise a significant portion of the total assets of the company. The annual depreciation charge depends primarily on the estimated useful economic lives of each type of asset and estimates of residual values. The directors regularly review asset useful economic lives and change them as necessary to reflect current thinking on remaining lives in light of prospective economic utilisation and physical condition of the assets concerned. Changes in asset useful lives can have a significant impact on depreciation and amortisation charges for the period. Details of the useful economic lives is included in the accounting policies.

4. DEPARTURE FROM COMPANIES ACT 2014 PRESENTATION

The directors have elected to present an Income Statement instead of a Profit and Loss Account in these financial statements as this company is a not-for-profit entity.
